**CONGRESS UNANIMOUSLY CALLS ON PRESIDENT TO
PERMANENTLY DESIGNATE SEPTEMBER 11 AS A
NATIONAL DAY OF VOLUNTARY SERVICE**

*Resolution Inspired by One Day's Pay, the 9/11 Grassroots Initiative That
Has Prompted Nearly 1 Million This Year to Engage in Acts of Service As a
Tribute to Those Lost to Terrorism*

NEW YORK (October 11, 2004) – Late Sunday evening, the United States Senate followed the U.S. House of Representatives in unanimously passing the concurrent resolution (H. CON. RES. 473) calling upon the President to permanently establish September 11 as an annually recognized day of voluntary service, charity and compassion. Because both the Senate and House passed the same resolution, the recommendations and actions of H. Con. Res. 473 are official and binding on both chambers.

The resolutions were inspired by One Day's Pay (www.onedayspay.org), the national nonprofit initiative to establish September 11 as a day of service, charity and compassion. One Day's Pay carries the support of all of the leading 9/11 family organizations and many major nonprofit groups and corporations including the American Red Cross, Points of Light Foundation/Volunteer Center National Network, Youth Service America, Citizen Corps, and other leading groups.

“As we saw this past anniversary, Americans continue to struggle with how to appropriately and meaningfully commemorate the tragedy and pay tribute to those who sacrificed so much on 9/11,” said David Paine, president of One Day's Pay. “The passage of this resolution shows the overwhelming support, from 9/11 family members to legislators, for transforming a day of terror and sadness into a day of generosity and compassion in the spirit of national unity. We call upon the President to quickly and expeditiously respond to the unanimous urging of Congress by proclaiming 9/11 as a national day of voluntary service.”

One Million Participated in 2004

This past September 11, nearly one million Americans participated in acts of goodwill towards others in commemoration of the third anniversary. New York City firefighters traveled to San Diego to help rebuild homes lost in last year's wildfires. Airline Ambassadors collected school supplies at 12 airline bases for Operation Iraqi Children. Hundreds of volunteers participated in service projects coordinated by local HandsOn Network locations. Employees of JPMorgan Chase hosted children with cancer and their families at a Long Island Ducks baseball game. A car salesman in Wasilla, Alaska donated his commissions on that day to Tuesday's Children.

About One Day's Pay

One Day's Pay, Inc., a New York-based 501c3 nonprofit organization established to encourage the observance of September 11 as a national day of voluntary service, charity and compassion, was founded in 2002 by David Paine, Jay Winuk and Alice Hoglan, along with other friends and colleagues. David, Jay and Alice came together soon after the terrorist attacks with the common vision that something positive needed to arise from the destruction and despair of 9/11. Jay lost his brother Glenn, an attorney and volunteer firefighter, during the attack on the World Trade Center.

Alice lost her son Mark, one of the heroic passengers of United Flight #93 who battled terrorists for control of the plane. David, president of the organization, was born in New York and is a long-time friend of Jay Winuk.
